Master Substation Upgrades benefit Western Trinidad

The Master Substation in Port of Spain is the only T&TEC Substation that provides power through a 6.6kV distribution system. The uniqueness of this Substation was extended in October this year when it became the only Substation to have two distribution voltages - a new 33/12kV transformer and 12kV switchboard. The enhanced capability of this Substation means that customers in the western section of Port of Spain will see a marked increase in reliability of their electricity supply.

Generator Supply for Gasparee

In August Distribution North commissioned a standby generator

to supply electricity to Gasparee Island. The submarine cable between the mainland and Gaspar Grande had failed earlier this year.

The installation of the 800KW generator, step up transformers and storage for fuel provided some logistical challenges for Distribution North but these were successfully overcome by the skillful expertise of personnel on the job.

The generator will remain in service until a new submarine cable is replaced. This is the first time a generator has been installed to directly service T&TEC customers on the distribution system for an extended period. The generator operates on a twenty-four hour basis and requires replenishing of fuel twice per month and regular service.



Operating Centre at Wrightson Road

A new operating centre has been established at #35 Wrightson Road, Port of Spain and was fully operational at the end of November 2008.

This move has become necessary to make way for the new Gateway Substation.

The containerized centre will accommodate the Cable Section, the Mechanical Garage, Streetlighting and Emergency Sections of Distribution North.

T&TEC's Mission Statement

Over the last months Distribution East celebrated several projects that support our Mission. Here are a few of these projects:

At Cleaver Park, Arima the high voltage circuit, which runs parallel to the Eastern Main Road, was converted into insulated high voltage overhead lines. This allows harmony of our electricity lines with the trees in the area.

3,000 new customers on Underground Residential Lines

 in conjunction with the Housing Development Corporation, many new housing developments within the Distribution East boundaries are being outfitted with an underground supply of electricity. These developments include Peas Tree Caura Road Development; Bates Trace, St Augustine; Farm Grove; La Horquetta; Maracas St. Joseph and Toco.

Five Rivers Substation transformer upgraded from 6 MVA to 12.5 MVA increasing supply capacity.

The Bamboo Interchange high voltage lines (near Grand Bazaar) have been rerouted to make way for the Highway Interchange project. Enhanced mobility, quicker response – 13 new vehicles including pole hole borers, lift trucks, canter bucket trucks and hotline bucket trucks were acquired.

Hot line works – many projects, including the Eddie Hart Grounds, have been successfully completed using hotline work techiques. This kind of work reduces the need to interrupt the supply to large volumes of customers and includes schools and businesses for routine maintenance activities.

Mt. Hope Substation Upgrade to provide a new 132/33/12kV supply. This increased capacity will inject more power into the Near East Ring and improve reliability to customers in north-east Trinidad.

ISTRIBUTION CENTRAL

Chaguanas West Substation Upgraded



Quick work by Distribution Central to replace the 3MVA Bryce 66/12kV transformer with a new 1-6MVA

Tyree 66/12kV transformer minimized outages to thousands of customers in the central area.

With the assistance of the Ministry of Works and the Trinidad and Tobago Defence Force the new 66/12kV transformer was transported from the Couva Substation to the Chaguanas West Substation and installation works commenced immediately.

The Bryce transformer had to be taken out of commission because of a fault at the Chaguanas West Substation during the afternoon of October

6th. Customers were quickly transferred to the adjacent 12kV circuits and a replacement sought.

A Ring Main Unit was installed to replace the existing oil 12kV switchboard and a new 12kV feeder, now referred to as the Orchard Gardens Feeder, was commissioned to offload the existing adjacent 12kV feeders.

The additional Substation capacity will provide back-up reliability to the fast growing Borough

of Chaguanas.

Several Departments came together to ensure the success of this project. Under the supervision of Acting Assistant Area Manager, Operations and Maintenance, Johann Rackal, the team included Substation Engineer Vijai Ramnanansingh, Senior Foreman Hohanlal Bhagaloo, Acting Substation Foreman Ivor Phillip and Electrician "A", Nigel Rampersadsingh and T&D Technician, Riaz Mohammed and their respective crews. Protection and Scada also assisted towards the success of this project.

Focus on Safety, Reliability and Aesthetics

T&TEC is developing an underground infrastructure for the country that is safe, reliable and aesthetically pleasing.

As part of this initiative, the Commission purchased eight hundred single-phase pad mounted transformers, which are being procured from supplier PROLEC GE Monterrey in Mexico.

Two Technical Assistant I Shazard Mohammed, Distribution South and Murvie Charles, Distribution East recently visited the PROLEC Plant to witness the testing and construction of the transformers.

Deeming the exercise a success, the Engineers also had this comment …"La PROLEC compania es muy efficiente y hace organizado" or The PROLEC company is very efficient and is organised". SOUTH

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Improving Efficiency at Tabaquite Substation

It took a mere two days by the Project Team from Distribution South and Scada and Protection Department for the Tabaquite Substation 2 -23 year old 66 kV JB428 oil circuit breakers to be replaced by the more efficient 66 kV gas circuit breakers.

This upgrade was necessary because maintenance of the old circuit breakers was increasingly cumbersome. Obtaining replacement parts was difficult and the maintenance of these breakers required large quantities of new insulating oil.

Now with the installation of the newer technology gas circuit breakers, maintenance down time has been reduced from two days to a few hours, resulting in a more efficient use of resources.

Brighton 66kV Substation Commissioned

The Brighton 66kV Substation houses two transformers, each with a capacity of 20/25 MVA.

This Substation was commissioned by Distribution South earlier this year and was constructed to meet the growing load demands of customers in the Labidco Industrial Estate and to provide power for the construction of several Union Industrial Estate plants, including the Alutrint aluminum smelter plant. The Tabaquite Substation supplies electricity to the villages in the Tabaquite community and is the critical electrical load provider for the WASA's Navet Water Works.

The successful completion of the Brighton Substation was made through the collective efforts of the Transmission Development and Engineering Services Department, (Substation design and civil and structural works); Protection and Scada Department (installation of protection systems) and Distribution South (installation of all 66kV and 12kV equipment and other low voltage systems).



Distribution South team included Technical Assistant I, Wendell Bhagirath; Senior Foreman, Dave Paterson,; Substation crews led by Rawle Romain, Steve Joseph and Amery Balkissoon and Cable crew led by Desmond Giles.

Corinth Substation Upgraded

Earlier this year Distribution South embarked on a project to upgrade aging equipment at the Corinth Substation to meet the growing needs of San Fernando and its environs and the environs of Princes Town.

This project involved the replacement of 2 forty-year old 66/12kV transformers; an upgrade of the 12kV oil circuit breaker board to a vacuum circuit breaker board and the modification and extension of the existing switch house.

Technical Assistant I Bhagirath explained the rationale for the transformer replacement to Was flooting "the old transformers could no longer meet the growing loads out of the Corinth Substation. Additionally these transformers developed oil leaks and were not in keeping with T&TEC's environmental consciousness".

Excerpts from Ernest F. Boxill, General Manager and Chief Executive Officer, T&TEC at the 54th Annual Employee Recognition and Awards 2008.

T&TEC accepts that its role is critical in ensuring that Government's Vision 2020 objectives are met. To guarantee that T&TEC remains a key player in the electricity

supply industry of our developing nation, several initiatives are being undertaken by the Commission.

In the upcoming months we expect to complete several projects that will allow us to remain one of the best essential service providers. Advances on the operational side of T&TEC's business include:

• ISO - 9001:2000 certification. T&TEC is confident that this Quality Management System will be the framework that allows the Commission to improve its service delivery to customers.

• The Cove Industrial Estate in Tobago is expected to be operational in the last quarter of 2009. When completed, this plant will have the capacity of providing 48 megawatts, with a possible expansion to 64 megawatts. • A new 720 megawatt combined cycle power station is to be installed at Union Estate, La Brea. This plant is expected to service Alutrin Ltd. as well as meet the load demand for the new Essar Steel Plant.

• Negotiations are now on the way between T&TEC and PowerGen for the addition of a backend steam unit to the recently installed gas turbine, 13 and 14 at the Pt. Lisas Power Stations. This will provide 100 megawatts of new capacity.

• The Gateway Project will support the tremendous development that is taking place in Port of Spain. The three phases of this project are on target with expected completion in 2010.

• The Wallerfield 132-66kV Substation is nearing completion and the extension of the 132kV double circuit transmission line from San Raphael Substation to Wallerfield Substation should be completed early in the 2nd quarter of 2009. This project will service the Eteck Tamana Park and surrounding areas.

Control Room gets Updated Display

Employees at the Control Centre now have the benefit of a Video Wall Display System (VWDS). This new system replaced the old rear screen projection system and was installed in May this year.

The VWDS is used on a continuous basis 24 hours, 7 days a week. It provides Control Centre employees with an overview of the transmission grid and allows response to operational problems as they occur.

According to Thomas Inkim, Manager, Protection and SCADA, "the system has enhanced the operations and functionality of the Transmission SCADA system". He explained, "the new VWDS complements the existing static mosaic map boards providing the Control Room employees with an instantaneous view of the entire transmission and sub transmission systems".

Mr. Inkim said "the VWDS has an extended range of capabilities

that includes live video feeds, remote surveillance, internet weather patterns, tracking and presentation of training materials. Additionally, the VWDS has the capacity to project an image on part of, or on each of, the individual cubes or across the entire matrix".

• The Reform 132kV Substation is completed and the Debe 132kV Substation is almost completed.

• The 220kV double circuit line being built from Union Estate to Brechin Castle Substation is well under way and should be completed by December 2009. This line is historic since it will be the highest voltage at which we will be energizing a transmission line. The previous highest was 132kV.

• T&TEC has installed over 10 Substation transformers at various distribution Substations to cater for the increased load demand and to improve the reliability of supply.

• The National Street Lighting Program (SLIU) has benefited citizens. To date over 134,825 streetlights have been installed, 125 kilometers of highway has been illuminated and 45 recreational grounds and parks have been lit.

• The Advanced Metering Infrastructure (AMI) began just one year ago. To date over 294,226 of these new meters have already been installed throughout the country.

News from IEEE

Three events marked the calendar of the Local Chapter of the Industry Applications Society (IEEE, T&T Section) over the last quarter.

In **September**, the IEEE hosted a workshop to launch the Teacher in Service Programme (TISP). The workshop was supported by the Ministry of Education and served to introduce the TISP in Trinidad and Tobago, foster a partnership between the engineering and educational sectors, highlight some of the challenges faced by the local pre-university education system and set the stage for its deployment across the country.

The IEEE local Chapter Chair, Professor Chandrabhan Sharma hosted the workshop which featured presentations by several distinguished professionals in the engineering fraternity.

In **October,** the IEEE held its 4th Annual Seminar at the Faculty of Engineering, UWI. Several Engineers from T&TEC made presentations at this seminar, among them Anil Bujhawan, Transmission Department and Peter Sammy, Design Engineering Services.

In **November**, a presentation was made on Thyristor Applications at another seminar held in conjunction with Year Three students from the Electrical and Computer Engineering Department, Faculty of Engineering, UWI.

Trevor Babwah, Shift Control Engineer, Systems Planning and Control Department and local Chapter Chairman of the Industry Applications Society chaired seminars in October and November.

In order to achieve our goal of excellence, all members of our Electric Family must embrace the Vision and Mission of T&TEC.

T&TEC is working hand in hand with our Government to realize its Vision 2020. Through cutting edge infrastructure and employee development we continue to support the robust pace of expansion in our capital and elsewhere.

Our development projects spans several new initiatives such as the new power station to be installed at the Cove Industrial Estate, which when completed will supply 64 megawatts of power to satisfy not only the needs of Tobago, but in a revolutionary reversal, for the first time, Tobago will return its excess power to Trinidad by way of a submarine cable. T&TEC is proud of several other groundbreaking achievements.

1. **Substation Upgrades** replacing old-fashioned oil circuit breakers with advanced Areva DT1 66kV gas circuit breakers.

2. Advanced completion of the fibre optic cable deployment project that will provide fibre connectivity to 100 substations and 20 operating centres.

3. The Commission exceeded its target of **90% same day connections** by 4% and achieved 99.8% same day re-connections. This marks a 0.2% improvement from the previous year.

4. **Fleet expansion** - eight new insulated articulating telescopic aerial lift trucks allocated across the Commission's distribution divisions.

5. The Street Lighting

Implementation initiative with over 136,911 streetlights already erected and more than twenty recreation grounds and parks illuminated.

6. **Advanced Metering Infrastructure** (AMI) would have replaced over 273,750 meters.

7. The **Gateway Substation** project entails the extension of 132kV supply of electricity from the Bamboo Substation Port of Spain via the Sea Lots area.

Fireworks Safety

If not handled properly, fireworks can cause burn and eye injuries to kids and adults. The best way to protect your family is not to use any fireworks at home.

Here are some safety tips for the use of fireworks.

- Buy only legal fireworks (legal fireworks have a label with the manufacturer's name and directions; illegal ones are unlabeled). Store them in a cool, dry place.
- Carefully set up and use fireworks in an area clear of overhead power lines. Do not string fireworks on utility poles
- Point fireworks away from homes, and keep away from brush and leaves and flammable substances.
- Kids should never play with fireworks.
- Have consideration for others babies, the sick and elderly. Limit your use.
- Think about the pets. Animals have sensitive ears and can be extremely frightened or stressed. Keep pets indoors to reduce the risk that they will run loose or get injured.





Have a Safe Christmas Season

When decorating for the Christmas season please be guided by the following safety tips:

- Keep paper and tinsel away from hot lights.
- Keep lights away from water.
- o When stringing lights outdoors, keep ladders away from overhead power lines.
- Unplug lights before you go to bed and before you leave your home.
- Ensure that electrical cords are completely insulated.
 - Check and replace any worn or damaged light sets.
 - Do not overload electrical circuits.
 - Use only approved lights and no more than 3 strings linked together.
 - Make sure there are working smoke detectors in your home.
 - Never use candles to decorate your Christmas tree.
 - Decorate with flame-retardant or noncombustible materials.
 - Secure the base of your Christmas tree to keep it from tipping over.
 - When purchasing Christmas lights pay attention to the packaging as this will indicate whether the lights can be used indoors, outdoors or for both.
