

Every year lightning causes property damage, many injuries and about 1,000 fatalities around the world. Voltage in a single cloud-to-ground lightning stroke can range from 100 million to 1 billion volts, with average temperatures of 27,000°C (the sun is only 6,000°C). Here are some tips to minimise the risk of lightning strikes to yourself and your loved ones.

What is Lightning?

Lightning is a very high electrical charge that travels from clouds to the ground or to other clouds. Lightning is usually formed in high, dark, anvil-shaped thunderclouds, which themselves can form in 30 minutes or less.

Because the length of a lightning bolt is anywhere from 2 to 16 kilometers, don't wait for the storm to be overhead before you seek shelter. The most damage is done when the cloud is 3 to 8km away. Therefore, it is possible to be struck by lightning in clear skies.

Lightning usually strikes the tallest good conductor. The safest place to be during a thunderstorm is inside a house, large building or enclosed vehicle.

When a storm approaches Get out of the water and harbour small boats.

- Stop construction on fences, pipelines or structural steel buildings.

- Stop tractors and the use of lawn equipment.
- Do not take laundry off the clothes line to avoid being struck by lightning.

When indoors

- Disconnect all electrical equipment to avoid possible damage.
- Keep away from open doors and windows, large appliances and metal pipes.
- Do not use hand-held electrical appliances or the telephone (except in emergencies).
- Do not wash dishes as domestic water pipes can act as a conductor.



In an open boat

- Sit or crouch on the deck.
- Do not touch controls needlessly (if you must, touch only one control at a time).

At sea

- Boat owners should ensure that their crafts are equipped with lightning protection systems.
- Stop all recreational activity.
- Take shelter inside the cabin.
- Drop or lash all antennae and fishing rods to horizontal positions.

Disconnect all electronics.

Inacar

- Keep your hands and arms inside the vehicle
- Do not touch any metal.

In the open

- If your hair stands on end or your skin starts to tingle, you may be about to be struck by lightning.
- Do not seek shelter inside small sheds or under metal. car ports.
- Put down golf clubs and get off golf carts, motorcycles, tractors and bicycles.
- Bend forward, placing your hands on your knees, to minimise the risk of becoming a lightning conductor.
- Do not lie flat- you will have a lot more contact with the ground- which can be potentially fatal.



When Lightning Strikes

Proper first-aid treatment can save a life. Electricity cannot be passed from a lightning victim to you.

Remember!

- Lightning usually strikes the tallest objects in the area- trees, utility poles, etc.
- Never shelter under trees in a thunderstorm.
- Never attempt to touch or move downed power lines. They may be "live".
